Vicar's Thoughts

It was a very positive sign of the changing times to see numbers of couples in Church hearing their Banns being read. Many of the couples were busy trying to catch Paula, our Wedding Clerk, after the Service to ask about orders of service, rehearsals, flowers and a hundred and one other things.

One of the questions we always ask couples is, which version of the Lord's Prayer they would like - those who are involved in church life will almost always choose the modern one and for those who are not, the traditional one. For many weddings, and also for funerals, it now matters little which version is chosen, as they are both now unknown to most people.

When we talk about the *modern* Lord's Prayer, we are talking of one that dates back to the 1960's but whether *modern* or *traditional*, there have been many variations down through the years: *Holy* be your name (Hallowed); Give us today the *bread of life* (Daily Bread); Forgive us our *sins* or in Scotland *debts* (Trespasses); Lead us not into *the time of trial* (temptation); *Who art* (Which art).

At the time of the ASB, Bishop Colin Buchanan suggested to General Synod that the Church should do what Sweden had done in moving from driving on the left to the right - to have a twenty four hour gap and start driving on the new side. I wonder if the Church had followed his lead and had twenty four hours of not praying the Lord's Prayer then only used the modern form, whether rather more people at weddings, funerals (and more importantly in their daily lives and devotions), would be able to pray the Lord's Prayer from memory.

Church Family News

Our Climate Challenge

In his sermons last (Climate) Sunday, Patrick laid out the challenge for us all in stark terms – we all, Christians and others alike, have a duty to respond in any way we can to the climate crisis that is upon us NOW. With the threat to every coastal city and community in the world from the predicted rise in oceanic levels, and little sign of man's rapacious zest for profit from exploitation of natural life-sustaining resources that feed that rise being moderated, the target of our actions is huge.

But how can we be sure to direct our aim to the bullseye? As Christians, it is a nobrainer! We have two lines of approach – the first is commit ourselves not to act like the Priest and the Levite in the parable of the Good Samaritan and "walk by on the other side". We need to live out the love of God for His Creation by engaging in the debate for its proper and sensitive management – joining campaigns, signing petitions, writing to

editors and MPs, choosing a few of the 1000s of individual obscenities being perpetrated against already vulnerable communities, both human and ecological, from the rain forests to the oceans to much closer to home. This can be done easily by signing up to one or more of the fantastic on-line lobbying organisations like SumOfUs or GreenPeace who have their fingers firmly on the pulse of climate injustice of every kind around the world. Just enter the names into your browser and read about what they do and how we can help them do it!

The second is to lead others by our own example in changing our behaviour and making adjustments to our life-styles to bring us back into closer harmony with the rhythms of life in the natural world. There are so many ways we can do this, some of which we have already got used to through the pandemic and we just need to continue with in the new reality towards which we are now heading – fewer flights, fewer car miles, more vegetable gardening, greater personal fitness.

Other examples include buying less "stuff", particularly gadgets and electrical goods and demanding that what we do buy should be easily repaired if it breaks down; being more alert to where the food we buy comes from (think global so buy local – and seasonal) and what it contains; planning our food purchases carefully to reduce the amount we waste; have two meat-free days a week; cut down on processed and ready-to-eat food; buy loose fruit and veg to cut down on plastic packaging... the possibilities are endless – it just needs a bit of thought and COMMITMENT!

If enough of us do these things and follow these two lines of approach, we can and will make a difference, and importantly, inspire others to do likewise. At St Peter's, we plan to resume our quest for raising our existing Bronze ECO-church status to silver and beyond – we are already well on the way: we just have to focus and ACT, which is what we all need to do.

As Christians, God called us to look after His creation – if we listen as we pray, we WILL receive His inspiration to do so!

Christian Aid Week

We now have a total for Christian Aid Week money raised, and it is a massive £2850.92, made up of £1323 from the virtual walk from Land's End to John O'Groats, and £1527.92 from the envelopes (both delivered to houses and collected in church). For comparison, we raised £1150 last year in the depths of lockdown (from the virtual climb of Kilimanjaro; no envelopes were delivered) and £1342 in 2019, so this represents a huge increase. A big thank you to everyone who contributed, whether by giving, walking, asking for support, delivering envelopes, or in any other way. On Climate Sunday last week we thought about climate justice and people like Rose in Kenya for whom climate change has made life so hard - this money will make a real difference to the work of Christian Aid and its partners in supporting our neighbours around the world.
